PASTORAL PERSPECTIVES

I heard recently about a middle-aged woman who had a serious heart attack and was taken to the hospital. While on the operating table, she had a near death experience. Seeing God, she asked, "Is my time up?"

God said, "No, you have another 43 years, two months and eight days to live." Upon recovery, the woman decided to stay in the hospital and have a face-lift, liposuction and tummy tuck. Since she had so much more time to live, she figured she might as well look even nicer. After her last operation, she was released from the hospital. While crossing the street on her way home, she was killed by an ambulance.

Arriving in front of God, she demanded, "I thought you said I had another 40 years?" Why didn't you pull me out of the path of that ambulance?"

God replied, "Girl, I didn't even recognize you."

Lent is welcomed for many reasons. But maybe the best reason is that we are forced to look deeply at ourselves. Sometimes, after many years we look into the mirror and look intently at our hairline, our midsection and a wrinkle or two and say to ourselves: "Is that really me? What happened to that athlete with curly black hair?"

Even more so, we might look at our spiritual life and say today: "Is that really me? What happened to that idealistic young Catholic or Christian who was ready to take on the world for the sake of Jesus? What ever happened to the idealism of my Confirmation, a soldier or Christ willing to do anything for the sake of the Kingdom of God? What happened to the commitment and enthusiasm that rushed over me after Confirmation?"

Lent is a wake-up call. We have fallen asleep: our minds are asleep.

Pastoral Perspectives continued

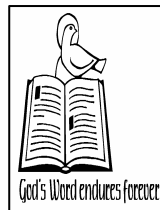
Over the years, things creep in like prejudice. We become so set in our minds that our minds are shut. A new idea tries to break in, but the doors to our minds are shut. We may even enjoy our lethargy. We refuse the strenuous struggle of thought. "The unexamined life," said Plato "is the life not worth living." But how many of us have really thought things out and thought them through? There is a kind of defense mechanism in us that makes us automatically shut the door against any disturbing thought. A person can drug him or herself mentally until the mind is sound asleep.

Lent hopes to give us a need to wake up. For long enough a person may live the routine of life, half asleep and then all of a sudden into life there comes some completely insoluble problem, some quite unanswerable question, some overwhelming temptation, some summons to an effort which the person finds beyond all their strength. In that day there is nothing left for the person to do but to "cry, clinging to heaven by the hems." Lent prepares us to reach out to God and others to see the real and certain answer to our prayers – in Jesus who came to suffer, to die and to be raised in glory. We can then see how "God is always doing something NEW."

As they were leaving Church one Sunday, a man confided to his friend that he was suffering from insomnia. The friend said that he had no trouble getting to sleep. "Really?" the first man inquired. "Do you count sheep?" "No," the other replied. "I listen to the Shepherd." We mutter and sputter, we fume and we spurt. We mumble and groan, our feelings are hurt. We can't understand things; our vision grows dim. But all that we need is a moment with Him.

- *Smile for the week:* "When you say your prayers to night don't forget to include grandma in them," the father said to his daughter. "Ask God to bless her and let her live to be very old." "My goodness, she's old enough," the daughter replied. "I'd rather ask God to make her younger!"

SCRIPTURE STUDY FOR NEXT SUNDAY

Next Sunday, March 7, is the 3rd Sunday in Lent. The readings will be: Exodus 3:1-8, 13-15; 1 Corinthians 10:1-6, 10-12 and Luke 13:1-9.

The life of a Christian is all about response. A Christian is one who hears a call to follow Jesus and whose life is the response to that call.

In the first reading next Sunday, Moses hears the call of God as it comes from the burning bush. Moses responds in humility, removing his sandals in reverence. He speaks with God and asks for details that will help him to do what God is asking. In the Gospel reading Jesus challenges his followers to reform their lives. He tells a parable about a fig tree which produced no fruit. The vineyard owner ordered it to be cut down. The vine-dresser asked that it be given one more year—to be tended and fertilized and then cut down if it still bore no fruit.

As one person put it, “Lent is the season of extra care our hearts may need to soften up and receive the seed of the Gospel.” Where have we encountered the “burning bush?” What has God asked of us? What extra care or prodding, during this Lenten season, do our hearts need that they might be better able to hear the Lord’s voice and respond?
