Time to Register for Children's Faith Formation Classes



Our children's faith formation program will be starting September 26th following our 9:15 Mass. Our program is for children in pre-k (4 year olds) through 8th grade. If your child is not attending a Catholic school, they should be attending a faith formation program at the church where the family is registered. As a church community we are here to assist you in bringing your child up in the Catholic faith tradition.

As reminder, a child must have completed one year of faith formation classes and be currently attending a program, or attending Catholic school before he/she can begin preparation to celebrate sacraments.

PASTORAL PERSPECTIVES

When we think of Jesus, we think of someone who heals. But that is only the beginning. Jesus intended that His disciples would be healers. "Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers, cast out devils," He said to them (Mt. 10:8). And imagine the disciples' unbounded admiration when he spoke these words to them: "I tell you most solemnly, whoever believes in Me will perform the same works as I do myself, he will perform even greater works, because I am going to the Father" (Jn. 14:12).

If you are a disciple of Jesus Christ you have been called to a ministry of healing.

In one of the great Renaissance paintings portraying the Lord and His disciples, Jesus is reaching out to touch and to heal a blind man. The disciples are leaning over His shoulder, watching. The scene reminds me of a senior doctor making the hospital rounds, with the young interns following along watching him, trying to learn, saying to one another, "How did he do that?"

As Jesus' disciples, we are expected to learn lessons in the art of healing and to put our learning into practice. The early Christians understood this clearly. They spent as much time healing as they did preaching the Gospel.

How can we be healers, without being sued for malpractice? Without having to provide health insurance? Without going to medical school?

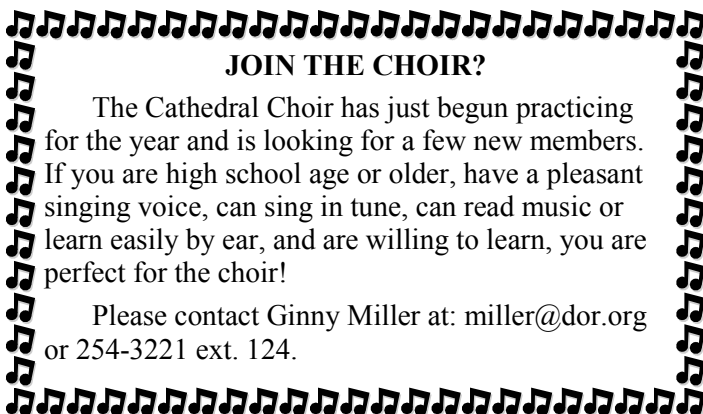

SCRIPTURE STUDY FOR NEXT WEEK

Next Sunday is the 25th Sunday in Ordinary Time. The readings will be: Amos 8:4-7; 1 Timothy 2:1-8; and Luke 16:1-13.

In next Sunday's Gospel Jesus again teaches using a parable or story. The parable recounts an apparently unjust manager whose rich employer asks him to account for his actions. The manager is certain that his employer will fire him and knows that he has no other skills. He does not want to go begging, so he comes up with a plan. He calls in all who owe debts to his employer and diminishes the debts on their invoices reasoning that, when he is fired, he will have made many friends of those he has aided and will, therefore, have other job opportunities and resources. Surprisingly, the employer gives credit to his devious employee.

Those hearing the parable may have been confused until they realized that Jesus was not encouraging dishonesty or deviousness. But, rather, He calls attention to the initiative and creativity with which the dishonest employee pursues his goal.

Jesus says, "the worldly take more initiative than the other-worldly when it comes to dealing with their own kind." Jesus challenges his disciples, including us, to be half as clever as this unjust manager in promoting the kingdom of God.

THE LITURGY CORNER

Is the Organ Too Loud? (Part I)

Since the Halloran-All Saints organ arrived in 2008, we have occasionally received comments from parishioners about the organ being too loud. We know the organ plays a variety of sounds (stops), sometimes loud, sometimes soft, balancing the needs of the music played, the liturgy, the season and the community.

What is the role of the organ in worship and how does our own Halloran-All Saints organ function together with the assembly, cantor, choir, as we raise our voices and hearts to God in worship? We'll be exploring these questions over the next few weeks as we look at the organ from the perspective of the organ builder, the organist, the assembly and our hopes for the liturgy and the Gospel message.
