Pastoral Perspectives

A man once decided to learn to bake bread. As often happens the first time around, he misread the recipe and he put two pounds of yeast into the dough. After faithfully following all the other instruction, he put the dough near the heat and waited. Some time later, his wife called down from her upstairs bedroom: "Have you put the dough in the oven yet, dear"? Frantically, he replied, "Put it in the oven? I can't even keep it in the kitchen!"

That's the New Testament: the leaven of the Word of God; the Name of Jesus; you "can't even keep it in the kitchen." You can't even keep it in the Church. It just expands into the world.

A couple of weeks ago, the Gospel showed us indirectly the influence of his father, Joseph on Jesus. He spoke another parable to them. "The Kingdom of Heaven is like leaven, which a woman took and hid in three measures of meal, until the whole was leaven." Perhaps this week we see the influence of his mother. In Palestine bread was baked at home; three measures of meal was the average amount which would be needed for baking for a fairly large family. Jesus took this parable of the Kingdom from something that He had often seen His mother, Mary do. He saw her work with the leaven, that little piece of dough that had been kept over from a previous baking; in the keeping it fermented. And leaven was simply a piece of fermented dough.

The whole point of the parable lies in one thing - the transforming power of the leaven. Leaven changed the character of the whole baking. Unleavened bread, bread baked without leaven, is like a water biscuit, hard, dry unappetizing and uninteresting; bread baked with leaven is soft and porous and spongy, and tasty and good to eat. The introduction of the leaven causes a transformation in the dough; and the coming of the Kingdom causes a transformation in life.

There is nothing more provable than the leavening power of a few followers of Christ on society. The Acts of the Apostles records that when Christianity reached Thessalonika, the citizens said: "These people who have turned the world upside down have come here." The sociologist Margaret Mead was said: "Never doubt that small groups of thoughtful

committed citizens can change the world; indeed it's the only thing that ever has."

Where our society is concerned, Jesus gives us the answer. We have to be the yeast of our society. It is our task as followers of Christ to be active in our society to eventually leaven the entire batch. I know that it is easy to say, "What can one person do?" But that is exactly it.

What am I doing to be the yeast in society? Perhaps the best modern example is Mother Teresa who had no intention of changing the world. She came across one dying person whom no one would bother with and she helped the one man die with dignity. And by that one act, she helped bring some goodness into the world and in fact started a revolution.

We have a belief in our society that you can fix anything by throwing money at it. But that's not the answer here. It takes personal involvement to be yeast.

Scripture Study for Next Sunday

Next Sunday, July 24, 2011, is the 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time. The readings will be: 1 Kings 3:5, 7-12; Romans 8:28-30; and Matthew 13:44-52.

For three Sundays now, we have heard Jesus use parables to describe the Kingdom of God. Parables are images or stories that help people understand a complex concept. The Kingdom of God, in its fullness, is beyond our wildest imaginations and unlike any earthly kingdom with which we are familiar. So Jesus helps his followers to imagine it.

The Kingdom of God is like a field where both weeds and wheat will grow together until the harvest; it is like a tiny mustard seed which will blossom into a plant so huge that it will be home to all the birds of the sky; it is like a small amount of yeast which enables "the whole mass of dough" to rise. Planting and baking bread are images that would have been particularly meaningful to the early Christians.

In next Sunday's Gospel, Jesus says that God's Kingdom might also be thought of like a buried treasure or a valuable pearl. It is something so precious that, once discovered, it is worth doing all in one's power to hold on to it. The Kingdom that Jesus is so anxious for us to understand and be part of has already begun through His death and resurrection. It is found in the community that follows Christ: striving to grow in the midst of distractions; welcoming all; enlivening the society in which it exists. We are a part of that community and it is our privilege to co-create, with God, the Kingdom in its fullness on earth and for all eternity.

Our relationship with Jesus Christ, and our part in the Kingdom, become the source and center of our life, "the pearl of great value." All that we are, and all that we have, is worth investing in this great treasure.

LITURGY CORNER

It seems that every time an agency is conducting a major funding drive, it is common to use a very large thermometer to show how the funds are growing towards the goal amount. Here at the Cathedral, we will be using the same type of device to show how we are working towards our goal of implementing the newly translated prayer texts of the Roman Missal, 3rd edition. However, instead of a thermometer, we will be using a "paschal candle." Around the base of the candle will be pieces that indicate the different councils, committees and groups, who have participated in a learning session of some kind on the new prayer texts. Horizontal lines going up the candle will show the different parish events we have done or will do in the future, i.e., the homilies in February on the parts of the Mass, that will help us prepare for the new prayers. Finally the flame of the candle will represent the First Sunday of Advent, November 27, 2011, when we will begin to use the new prayer texts.

Watch the Narthex area this week as we build this paschal candle. Next weekend you will be able to see how far we have come and how far we have to go. When you come to the weekend liturgies from now until November check to see what we have added to the candle. Also watch for the displays that we will have up in the Narthex in the near future. They will all have something to do with the liturgy, like vestments, vessels, books, and other items which help us to understand the liturgy.

Next week: a review of the Parts of the Mass.

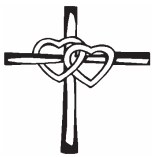
