



PASTORAL PERSPECTIVES

Imagine that you are the main beneficiary of a distant relative's will. It seems that this relative was quite eccentric as well as quite wealthy. A great deal of money is left for you to spend, but there are certain rules. Everyday for a year, your bank account would be credited with \$86,400. If you wanted to spend any of this money, you had to produce bills showing why money was being withdrawn from your account. You could not save the money in another account. At the end of the banking day, whatever you did not spend would be removed from your account. The next day you would start with a fresh \$86,400.

I am sure that you and I would find some really creative things to do with the money.

Now, let's return to reality. Every day we are given 86,400 seconds to make the best use of. Every night, God writes off whatever portion of this time we have not used well or have wasted. In the bank of time, there are no balances and no overdrafts. Each day a new account is opened for us. Each night what remains is written off, lost, gone forever.

Every day's 86,400 seconds has to be invested wisely in commodities that will hold their value from day to day, quarter to quarter, year to year and beyond. Lasting values need to be found, values like justice, compassion, forgiveness and love.

The scriptures during these weeks toward the end of the liturgical year present us with challenging reflections on final days. How much time do we have left? We really don't know. The proper Christian attitude is not to deny death, but to prepare for it. You don't prepare for the end by doing a lot of stuff. You prepare by nurturing the proper dispositions, the Christian attitude. "Be transformed by renewal of mind." Paul tells us to take an attitude of life that is completely different from the world. Throughout the Gospels, Jesus emphasizes the need for inner transformation. His complaints against the Pharisees were that they were hypocrites. They behaved one way, but were actually another way. He called them whiten sepulchres. On the outside, they looked nice and clean. On the inside they were rotten. The tax collectors and prostitutes who turned to Jesus transformed their lives. Their devotion to the Lord was a reflection of the Christian disposition they had taken on. How so we form and nourish the Christian attitude of life? We cannot get virtue and character on a credit card; we must

SCRIPTURE STUDY FOR NEXT SUNDAY

Next Sunday, November 21st is the Feast of Christ the King. The readings will be: 2 Samuel 5:1-3; Colossians 1:12-30; and Luke 23:55-43.

Next weekend the church closes the liturgical/worship year with the celebration of the Feast of Christ King. On the following Sunday, the new liturgical year begins with the First Sunday of Advent. Each year, through Scripture and worship, the church enters into the cycle of salvation – from the promise of a Messiah to the people of Israel, through Christ's birth, life, death and resurrection, to the celebration of his kingship over earth and heaven.

In the first reading we hear about King David, a shepherd boy chosen by God to be king over all the tribes of Israel. Under David's rule, these tribes were unified into one people, worshipping one God. Through the line of St. Joseph, Jesus was a descendant of David.

Luke's Gospel conveys the nature of Jesus' kingship. In our reading Jesus hangs on a cross, dying as the crowds mock him and challenge him to save himself if he is really the king of the Jews. Jesus is a king who has humbled and emptied himself in service to others, even as it led to his death and through his death he has opened his heavenly kingdom to us.

The reign of Christ has begun, it is here and now, though not yet fully revealed. Through Baptism we share in the kingship of Christ – called to be humble servants of one another.
