**PASTORAL PERSPECTIVES**

A man who was severely depressed because he "wasn't getting ahead," told his wife that his life was without purpose. "What do you mean that you have nothing to live for," she replied. "The house isn't paid for, the car isn't paid for, and the furniture isn't paid for. You have A LOT to live for!"

It is often possible for persons to be more clear-eyed in disaster than in prosperity. Some of the noblest literature of the ancient Hebrews was produced during the Babylonian captivity when many of the Jews had been carted off to exile. Lincoln's Gettysburg Address – often called the noblest speech ever made in America – came in the darkness of the Civil War.

There is something about dark times that can inspire our most profound thoughts on the really important questions about life.

Christian joy is not "pie-in-the-sky." It is not wishful thinking. Peter and Paul were not Pollyannaish. Neither is Jesus. We don't need the gospels to tell us that life is a struggle. But we do need the gospel to tell us what that struggle is all about. We do need the gospel to establish the link between the coming Kingdom and the present kingdom, between where we are going and where we are, between things as they are and things as they ought to be.

We who have sighted the Kingdom can never be totally at home --- totally happy – with things as they are. The New Testament tells us that we are "strangers and pilgrims here"; that we "have no abiding city." That is why we who have sighted the coming Kingdom must be involved in the ongoing struggle to redeem the times in which we live. Where there is hate, we must bring love. Where there is despair, we must bring hope. Where there is unbelief we must bring light."

A psychologist, Erich Fromm says that people are distinguished by whether they are death-oriented or life oriented. But the roots of the differences are more than psychological. They spring from that deep level of our being where we decide either to adjust as comfortably

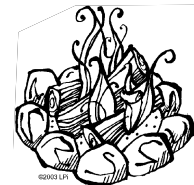


**SPECIAL FAMILY EVENT

**SCRIPTURE STUDY FOR NEXT SUNDAY**

Next Sunday, June 11 2011, is Pentecost Sunday. Our readings will be: Acts 2:1-11:1; 1 Corinthians 12:3-7, 12-13; and John 20:19-23.

The feast of Pentecost has a long history. Pentecost originated as a celebration marking the wheat harvest. For the Jews, Pentecost became the feast commemorating the covenant made with God at Sinai and was celebrated fifty days after Passover.

In the reading we will hear from the Acts of the Apostles, Pentecost takes on yet another meaning. For the followers of Jesus, it is the occasion of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, the celebration of the New Covenant established through the death and resurrection of Jesus. With the events of Pentecost, the work of Jesus is continued in the world, the Church takes on its mission. The followers of Jesus were filled with the Holy Spirit and "began to express themselves in foreign tongues and make bold proclamations as the Spirit prompted them."

Scholars point out the contrast between the Old Testament account of the Tower of Babel and Luke's Pentecost description. At the Tower of Babel, people rejected their need for God, and their sins of greed and ambition caused their division. Each began to speak a different language, emphasizing their inability to communicate and work together as one people with an awareness of their need for God. Now, the followers of Jesus know their need for God's presence and God gives them the Holy Spirit, a source of strength and unification for the body of Christ, the Church.

Our faith tells us that we have been given the same Spirit. As we approach the feast of Pentecost it is helpful to ask ourselves: How have I experienced the presence of the Holy Spirit in my life? How am I using the gifts which the Spirit gives me to serve the people of God, to help unify and build the kingdom of God?
