



**PASTORAL PERSPECTIVES**

We will soon begin here at the Cathedral (and throughout the diocese) a series of homilies that will address the changes that will begin in the translation of the mass texts beginning in Advent (November) 2011. The bishops of the United States have invited us all to a renewal in our appreciation and understanding of the Eucharist, and our unique role and responsibilities in our participation in the Eucharist. The changes involve not just words that may be different in the mass, but a greater awareness in our understanding of the centerpiece of our Christian experience – our communal worship and praise of God.

It was over fifty years ago that the Fathers of the Second Vatican Council invited Catholics of the world to a renewed vision of the mass. Perhaps the most startling change was the celebration of the mass in the vernacular instead of Latin. But there was also a deeper invitation extended by the Council, to enter more actively into the mass and to participate more fully. This has been an on-going thrust for the liturgical renewal and will have renewed emphasis as we prepare for the use of the new translations.

As the bishops have reminded us, to foster active participation goes beyond knowing what to say, when to say it and what is the correct posture. It must be both interior and exterior. Over the next several months we hope to grow in our understanding of what the Eucharist is and means for us. Active participation means not only proclaiming the words at mass, but just as importantly, going forth from our celebration conscious of our responsibility to live the mass and proclaim the message that we have just celebrated. Our catechesis will hopefully deepen our participation and nurture our Christian commitment.

Please pray over the next several months for the success of our mutual efforts to renew our love for the mass and realize the invitation extended to us several years ago by the Second Vatican Council: “full, conscious and active participation” in the Eucharist.

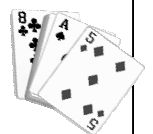

### SCRIPTURE STUDY FOR NEXT SUNDAY

Next Sunday, January 23<sup>rd</sup>, will be the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time. The readings will be Isaiah 8:23-9:3; 1 Corinthians 1:10-13, 17; and Matthew 4:12-23.

In last week's Gospel account, John the Baptist identified Jesus as God's chosen One. This week Matthew points out that after his baptism Jesus journeyed from Nazareth to Capernaum, a city near Zebulum and Naphtali, to begin his public ministry. Matthew also includes in his Gospel the same prophecy of Isaiah that we will hear in the first reading: "First the Lord degraded the land of Zebulum and the land of Naphtali; but in the end he has glorified (them.)"

The gospel reading goes on to describe Jesus calling his apostles. First he called the brothers, Simon (Peter) and Andrew, and then the brothers, James and John. All were fishermen and as they heard Jesus' invitation they immediately left what they were doing in order to follow him and take part in his mission – proclaiming the good news, teaching and curing "people of every disease and illness." We, those baptized into Jesus Christ, share this same mission. Jesus waits for the same ready and enthusiastic response that he received from Peter, Andrew, James and John. And our parish, neighborhood and world wait for us to be Christ in the world, spreading the good news, curing 'every disease and illness.'

Who are the poor today? The federal government labels as "poor" any individual living on less than \$10,820 a year. A poor family of four live on less than \$22,050. In New York, two-thirds of families with incomes below the poverty level include one full-time worker. To continue working, these families need assistance with child care and transportation.

For people living in poverty, secondary support systems are often necessary to obtain or maintain employment. Among these are job training, affordable child care & transportation to and from work. As followers of Jesus, how can we advocate on behalf of these families?

Our Diocesan Public Policy petition will advocate to legislators on behalf of working families struggling to survive.
