“Let your light shine!” This year’s Catholic Ministry Appeal is in full swing and provides us with another opportunity to share our gifts with the larger Church. The theme of this year’s campaign reminds us of the many ways we can light the darkness of those in our community who are suffering and families and individuals who have been challenged in a variety of ways. Bishop Clark, in announcing the kick-off of this year’s campaign mentioned that the many food banks that are providing emergency food service are seeing an increased demand throughout our twelve county diocese. Some of those in need are seeking relief for the first time due to recent economic hardships and the economy.

The CMA funds ministries for more than 314,000 Catholics in the diocese including faith formation, Catholic Charities, Catholic schools, campus and young-adult ministry, hospital chaplaincy and inmate programs, migrant farmer outreach, priesthood vocations promotion, ministries of the Vatican and the United Conference of Catholic Bishops, parish support, evangelization through modern media, promotion of Catholic values on the sanctity of human life, interreligious and ecumenical dialogue, preparation of those wishing to be married and those wishing to join the Catholic Faith.

The Cathedral Community has been enriched by many of the diocesan services that are available to us. This past year, the Office of Evangelization and Catechesis assisted us with our search for a new youth minister. The Human Resources office has been most helpful in regards to employment issues and the Information Technology office has been most helpful in assisting us with our many technological needs. The diocese offers many workshops and conferences that assist us in our pastoral ministry.

Hopefully by now you have received your letter and invitation from our bishop to participate in this year’s campaign and have responded with a gift that matches your capabilities at this time. SCRIPTURE STUDY FOR NEXT WEEK

Next Sunday, October 17th, is the 29th Sunday in Ordinary Time. The readings will be 2 Kings 5:14-17; 2 Timothy 3:14-4:2 and Luke 18:1-8

Next Sunday's gospel reading includes a parable which teaches us about the importance of persistence in prayer. It also makes connection between prayer and faith.

The parable is about a widow and a judge. According to Jewish law, a widow was considered helpless and was therefore guaranteed certain rights according to the law. This particular widow had been denied her rights by a judge "who respected neither God nor man." But the widow did not let up on her requests. Finally, the judge found himself worn out and afraid that she might do him violence! He decided to settle in her favor.

Having told this parable Jesus invites his followers to consider the justice that God will bestow - - out of love - - on the people who "call out to him day and night" - - surely it will be far greater than the justice finally granted by the corrupt and worn down judge.

This gospel reading encouraged those early Christians, who thought that Jesus would probably return to them during their lifetime, to continue to pray and not be discouraged while they waited, and it is meant to encourage us today. Persistent prayer is a sign. It is a sign of faith and a means of faith. It is a sign of our faith in God's persevering love for us.

THE LITURGY CORNER**Is the Organ Too Loud? Part 5**

But I can't hear the cantor or choir over the organ. In this segment of our series I'd like to address these concerns.

The cantor's primary role is to sing the Psalm and then other solos in the liturgy such as the gospel verse, invocations of the Lamb of God, verses of the communion song. If you can't hear the cantor on these, please let us know!

Acclamations (Alleluia, Holy Holy, Christ Has Died and Amen) and hymns belong to all of us and it is actually the organ which leads them. You may notice the cantor giving additional support on hymns if they are unfamiliar or the assembly is small but we are trying to move away from this because it is your voices that should be heard! The most beautiful sound to the cantor is that of your singing!

The choir sings alone at the preparation of gifts (and should be heard above the instrument then) but other times their harmonies should blend into the one glorious sound of all of us singing.

Assembly singing is important – whether it be accompanied or unaccompanied (our sung responses to Fr. Kevin in the Preface Dialog, singing the Lord's Prayer, or verse 1 of Amazing Grace). When our singing is accompanied it needs a solid, reassuring foundation so that we will keep singing. It is quite a balancing act isn't it, trying to inspire greater participation and yet not overwhelm us so our voices seem unimportant.

We use various techniques – unaccompanied singing, additional instruments, various sounds on the organ to try to help our singing catch fire because vibrant singing changes communities – just as vibrant communities sing well! It's the chicken or the egg story and we need to strive for both because they are connected.

When we sing "Will you go where you don't know... will you care for cruel and kind" in John Bell's **The Summons**, or "Here the love of Christ shall end divisions, all are welcome in this place" in Marty Haugen's **All Are Welcome**, we are working toward the building of the kingdom. Chicken or egg indeed!
