



PASTORAL PERSPECTIVES

This year when we listen to the Gospel at Mass, we will be hearing the Good News as told by Matthew, one of the four fundamental portrayals of Jesus upon which the Church bases its understanding of what God's Son was like when he walked amongst us. We hear Matthew's description of the values Jesus came to teach and live and how Jesus accomplished our salvation.

Matthew's gospel was probably written in the period 80-90 A.D. The Christian Community where Matthew wrote the Gospel was struggling with how Gentiles and Jewish converts to Christianity could live and work together. Matthew reflects back to the words and actions of Jesus that provided the community with some direction and hope. He used the Gospel of Mark, and included many of his stories of Jesus. Matthew added more insights into this remarkable person – how what happens in the Gospel matches Old Testament hopes and expectations.

WELCOMING THE NEW ROMAN MISSAL

This box is a new addition to our weekly bulletin. We are preparing to receive the new translation of the Roman Missal in November of this year. This translation will be welcomed throughout the world by all countries that use English as their official liturgical language. (This is not an initiative of the United States or the Diocese of Rochester alone!) The Roman Missal contains all the prayers and instructions we use at the celebration of the Eucharist. The new translation will reflect a more accurate translation of the Latin from which the text is taken, and it will employ language in our prayer that is dignified, solemn and beautiful, and conveys the sacredness we celebrate.

Next week, Fr. McKenna will talk more about this preparation in his homily. Then, during the weeks of February, we will have the opportunity to renew our knowledge and understanding of the Mass as a way of deepening our faith and participation in the Eucharist, the center of our Catholic prayer life.

I encourage you to read the selection from Matthew's gospel that will be read the following weekend at Mass. Spend some time praying over the passage and picturing the scene that Matthew describes. Ask God to help you come to know Jesus even more deeply – that you may put his words and deeds into action.

- *Thought for the week:* Learn to forgive yourself.
- *Smile for the week:* One four-year-old prayed, "And forgive us our trash baskets as we forgive those who put trash in our baskets."

SCRIPTURE STUDY FOR NEXT SUNDAY

Next Sunday, January 30th, will be the Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time. The readings will be: Zephaniah 2:3, 3:12-13; 1 Corinthians 1:26-31; and Matthew 5:1-12a.

In last Sunday's Gospel reading we heard Jesus proclaimed by John the Baptist as "the Lamb of God," the Messiah. This event signaled the beginning of Jesus' public ministry. This week we heard Jesus call the apostles, those who would first share his ministry. Next Sunday we will hear Jesus begin to describe the qualities befitting his disciples.

Scholars tell us that in the ancient Near East, mountains were thought of as sacred sites where humans and gods made contact, privileged places of God's revelation. We are also told that only teachers with recognized authority would sit down to proclaim their doctrine. These insights help us to appreciate the setting of next week's Gospel as Jesus climbs the mountain to deliver what has come to be known as "the Sermon on the Mount." We can visualize Jesus as those with him must have – as the 'new Moses' giving 'new revelation' on a 'new Mt. Sinai.'

Jesus' message was the Beatitudes: blessing statements that describe the personal qualities of those who truly try to follow Jesus. These statements set forth a description of a Christian attitude toward life, an attitude that is counter-cultural to the materialism of the world, but that lives out the values of the kingdom of God. In living out these values, the Christian anticipates and shares the happiness and joy of God's kingdom, here and now, already begun.
