



PASTORAL PERSPECTIVES

The proprietor of a café in Nevada was so sure that his bartender had the strongest hands around that he offered a standing one thousand dollar bet that went as follows: The burly bartender would squeeze a lemon until all the juice ran into a glass. Then he would hand the lemon to a challenger. Anyone who could squeeze one more drop of juice would win one thousand dollars.

People came from miles around to see the competition. All kinds of strong men tried to win the money: weight lifters, longshoremen, cowboys, physical trainers, but nobody could do it.

One day, a scrawny little man came into the tavern wearing thick glasses and a rumpled suit. In a tiny, squeaky voice he said to the bartender, "I'd like to try the bet." Several people in the assembled audience snickered. Then the confident bartender grabbed a lemon. With practiced effort he squeezed it dry and handed the shriveled rind to the little man. More laughter came from the audience. The audience was then silent as the little man clenched his fist around the lemon. He squeezed until his whole face turned red as a tomato. Then, with one more great effort the little man squeezed the seemingly empty lemon shell and six drops fell into the glass. As the crowd cheered, the bartender paid the thousand dollars and asked the little man: "What do you do for a living?" Are you a lumberjack, a weight-lifter, or what?" Pocketing the prize, the little man said: "I work for the IRS"

Perhaps some of you have had an experience in which it seemed that the Internal Revenue Service or some other government authority was trying to squeeze the life out of you.

Jesus gave his authority to the disciples as went forth to preach and heal in his name. Jesus tells them to carry little luggage and to just proclaim the word and then move on. If people accept the word – great. If they don't - leave quickly, but bring the word of God to the next village.

All of this goes very much against the standard procedures of our information age. Standard procedures for our time is to get a test sampling of what people believe or want to believe and then deal with that as a truth. *USA Today*, CNN polls, Gallup polls, all tell us what the majority is thinking and then treat it as though it were the truth. The Holy Father and the U.S. bishops have spoken out strongly when it appears that public opinion or our votes is driving our belief in what is right or wrong.

The bishops have been particularly emphatic in reminding Catholics who serve in public office of their moral responsibility to defend life in all its stages: "No public official, especially one claiming to be a faithful and serious Catholic, can responsibly advocate for or actively support direct attacks on human life... no appeal to policy, procedure, majority will or pluralism ever excuses a public official from defending life to the greatest extent possible."

The truth is not dependent on the people to whom it is addressed. The truth is dependent on the fidelity of the proclaimer to the message received from God.

Jesus says: "I am the Way, the Truth and the Life." We have to stand for the truth of the Lord, whether it is popular or not, whether it is convenient or not. We have been given the authority by our baptism to go out and proclaim the Word. Today we pray for the courage to proclaim the truth at work, in our neighborhoods, and in our families.

SCRIPTURE STUDY FOR NEXT SUNDAY

Next Sunday is the 16th Sunday in Ordinary Time. The readings will be: Genesis 18: 1-10; Colossians 1:24-28; and Luke 10:38-42.

In today’s gospel reading Jesus used the parable of the Good Samaritan to teach us what it means to love our neighbor. To truly love one’s neighbor is one of the requirements for anyone who would be a disciple of Jesus and who would wish to spend eternity with Him.

In next Sunday’s reading from the book of Genesis we see another example of outstanding hospitality. The Lord appeared to Abraham in the form of three guests. When Abraham saw the three men approach his tent he bathed their feet and had them rest under a tree while he and his wife, Sarah, prepared them a meal. The tradition of hospitality which we see in the Old Testament continues in the Christian tradition we believe that Christ is present in every neighbor and guest.

Next Sunday’s gospel deepens our understanding of Christian service and hospitality. It is the story of Jesus’ visit to Martha and Mary. Martha, “who was busy with all the details of hospitality,” complains to Jesus that her sister, Mary, has left all the work to her while Mary just sits at Jesus’ feet. Jesus replies that “one thing only is required. Mary has chosen the better portion....”

In a general way we are reminded that the most important part of hospitality is to be attentive to the person we encounter. We are not to be so concerned with the routine of hospitality that we would forget to listen to those we meet, to encounter each of our “neighbors” as unique children of God. And for the Christian, the disciple of Jesus Christ, there is another lesson in our gospel. Christian service is of the utmost importance, but first we must fulfill our commitment to love Jesus. Our service of others must be grounded in our prayer life and in our relationship with the person, Jesus Christ.
