

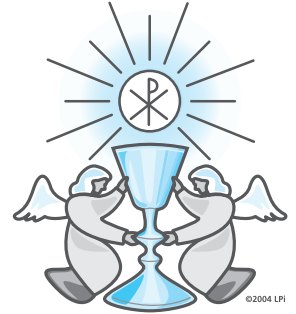
PASTORAL PERSPECTIVES

How do we distinguish between a real calling by the Lord and all the voices competing for our attention in our multi-tasking, multi-aps age? Read John Neafsey's book, *A Sacred Voice is Calling: Personal Vocation and Social Conscience* (Orbis Books, 2006). Neafsey, a clinical psychologist and senior lecturer in the department of theology at Loyola University in Chicago, provides a very thoughtful examination of vocation, social conscience and the prophetic tradition. The book is not necessarily directed towards those who might suspect they have a vocation to the priesthood or religious life – although they would profit by a read. It is more directed to all Christians who must at one time struggle to know God's plan and design for them. "What does it mean to find and follow a personal calling? How do we know what we are meant to do with our precious time and talents and treasure during our short lives here on this earth? What happens if we miss our calling – maybe because we fail to hear it or we don't have the courage to follow it? (ix)" Neafsey helps the reader explore these provocative questions.

As Neafsey explains, our calling or vocation is found in the places where our "'deep gladness' and the world's deep hunger' meet, on the holy ground where our heart's desire comes together with what the world most needs *from* us" (p. 1). Neafsey goes on to explain how we must learn to more thoughtfully listen to God speaking to us, and the variety of means that God uses to communicate a plan. Time honored methods such as prayer and meditation are explained, as well as an easily dismissed but vital process – the capacity to really see, hear and understand others. But no matter what our "vocation," the author believes we must listen attentively to the "cry of the poor." God's voice can be heard and discerned in the "needs and sufferings of our fellow human beings" (p. 26)." Neafsey teaches that

The bottom line for Neafsey is discerning our call in this world by finding a way to live on this earth "in good conscience." The author concludes by challenging us all about how well we have accepted our vocational call to be disciples of the Lord: "...[I]n the mind of Jesus our lives are ultimately evaluated or judged by a simple standard: whether or not we have been loving persons during our lifetime."

**SCRIPTURE STUDY FOR NEXT SUNDAY**

Next Sunday, July 3, 2011, is the Fourteenth Sunday of Ordinary Time. The readings are Zechariah 9:9-10; Romans 8:9, 11-13; and Matthew 11:25-30.

As we return to Ordinary Time readings next weekend, we are given a reminder of what it means to live in Christ. In the New Testament reading, St. Paul reminds us that human beings are always pulled in two directions, we have two motivations: the flesh and the spirit. The 'flesh' would have us totally burdened under the influence of our human condition, weighed down by the concerns and limitations of earthly existence. The 'spirit' is that part of our being that has been made by God so that we might interact with God; the spirit is open and ready to be shaped by the Spirit of God who dwells in us and invites us to see our lives in a different context – as part of the Kingdom of God revealed to us by Jesus Christ.

In the Gospel reading, Jesus praises God for revealing this truth to 'little ones,' that is, to anyone who is open to receiving it. Power, knowledge and authority are not required; God offers this revelation through his Son, Jesus Christ, to all who will receive it. All that is required is a humble heart - like Christ's and like that of the humble king described by the prophet Zechariah who comes riding on a donkey and proclaiming peace.

The Gospel reading also describes the effect of living in the Spirit. Jesus says "Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart; and you will find rest for yourselves. For my yoke is easy and my burden light." Our personal crosses are truly heavy, just as Jesus' cross was truly heavy, but in the context of the Kingdom of God, they are not the final word and we do not carry them alone...love has defeated sin and death and God's Spirit dwells in us, sharing and lightening our burden and guiding us to life-giving choices.

LITURGICAL CORNER



Last Sunday, which was the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity and again this weekend which is the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, we are hearing homilies which direct us toward the liturgy and the upcoming introduction of the newly translated prayer texts which are a part of the 3rd edition of the Roman Missal issued in 2002 by Pope John Paul II. As you may recall, in February, we had a series of four homilies which provided information to help us understand the four parts of the Mass: the Introductory Rites, the Liturgy of the Word, the Liturgy of the Eucharist and the Concluding Rites.

Our homilies last weekend and today deal with other aspects of the liturgy. On Trinity Sunday, our homily dealt with the Trinitarian nature of the prayers of the liturgy. That is, our Mass prayers are always prayed to and about God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It is this three-fold nature of the one God which binds our prayer together. This is especially true during the Eucharistic Prayer when, through the Father and the Son, we invoke the Holy Spirit to come upon our gifts of bread and wine to make them once again the Body and Blood of Christ.

This weekend, when we honor most especially that mystery and truth of the Body and Blood of Christ given to us repeatedly in the Mass, our homily directs us to living the Eucharistic life. As we participate in the liturgy, we are patterned for living the Gospel message. The liturgy forms us as followers of Christ and directs us to being Christ for others as we go about our lives in the world.

The homilies of these two weekends help to bring to a close some of the preparation for the new prayer texts. In September, we will begin to introduce and practice the new prayers so that we will be ready for their formal implementation on the First Sunday of Advent.

Be sure to watch the Narthex during the summer months for some displays referring to the liturgy.
